AN ORDINANCE OF THE COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF MATAWAN APPROVING AN AMENDMENT TO THE REDEVELOPMENT PLAN FOR THE DESIGNATED REDEVELOPMENT AREA IN THE VICINITY OF THE MATAWAN TRAIN STATION PURSUANT TO THE NEW JERSEY LOCAL REDEVELOPMENT AND HOUSING LAW (NJSA 40A:12A-1, ET SEQ.)

WHEREAS, on July 5, 2000, the Borough Council of the Borough of Matawan (the "Governing Body") approved Resolution No. 00-07-08 which designated certain lands in the vicinity of the train station as a "Redevelopment Area" pursuant to the Local Redevelopment and Housing Law (NJSA 40A: 12A-2 et seq.); and

WHEREAS, the New Jersey local Redevelopment and Housing Law, NJSA 40A:12A-1 et seq., authorizes the Borough Council of the Borough of Matawan ("the Governing Body") to adopt by ordinance redevelopment plans for areas in need of redevelopment or rehabilitation; and

WHEREAS, the Governing Body previously adopted the Redevelopment Plan (the "Redevelopment Plan") for the Designated Redevelopment Area in the Vicinity of the Matawan Train Station by Ordinance on April 30, 2001; and

WHEREAS, the Unified Planning/Zoning Board of Adjustment of the Borough of Matawan (the "Planning Board") adopted a Master Plan Reexamination Report on November 3, 2014; and

WHEREAS, the Master Plan Reexamination Report (the "Reexamination Report") recommended that it has since become necessary to amend the Redevelopment Plan to respond to current market conditions and promote development and redevelopment that is in the best interest of the Borough; and

WHEREAS, the Unified Planning/Zoning Board of Adjustment of the Borough of Matawan (the "Planning Board") adopted a new comprehensive Master Plan (the "Master Plan"), including an updated Land Use Plan Element on October 6, 2015; and

WHEREAS, the Master Plan reaffirms the recommendations set forth in the Reexamination Report regarding the need to update and amend the Redevelopment Plan and finds that the adoption of the revisions to the Train Station Redevelopment Area will jumpstart the redevelopment process around the train station and will complement the revitalization efforts in and around Matawan's downtown; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the provisions of the New Jersey Local Redevelopment and Housing Law, NJSA 40A:12A-1 et seq. (the "LRHL"), the Governing Body authorized the preparation of an amendment to the redevelopment plan for the Designated Redevelopment Area in the Vicinity of the Matawan Train Station, in the tract defined as Blocks 1, 2, 3, 4, and 11.01, and a portion of Block 11, including Lots 23, 24, 25.01, 26, 27, 29, 30, 40, 41 and 42; and

WHEREAS, the Borough's planning consultant, T&M Associates, has prepared an amendment to the redevelopment plan for the Designated Redevelopment Area in the Vicinity of the Matawan Train Station dated October 22, 2015 (the "Transit Station Redevelopment Plan Amendment"), a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to NJSA 40A:12-7, the Governing Body referred the Redevelopment Plan Amendment to the Planning Board for review; and

WHEREAS, the Governing Body hereby determines that the Redevelopment Plan is necessary and appropriate and will effectuate redevelopment and rehabilitation within the Borough.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Borough Council of the Borough of Matawan, in the County of Monmouth, that the Redevelopment Plan attached hereto dated October 22, 2015, is hereby adopted.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that all prior Ordinances that are inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that this Ordinance shall become effective immediately upon final passage and publication as required by law, as the "Ordinance Approving An Amendment to the Transit Station Redevelopment Plan."

CHAPTER 4 – LICENSING AND BUSINESS REGULATIONS*

SECTION 4-3 – PEDDLERS, HAWKERS AND VENDORS
SECTION 4-4 – SOLICITORS AND CANVASSERS

BE IT ORDAINED, by the Council of the Borough of Matawan, County of Monmouth, State of New Jersey, that Chapter 4 of the Code of the Borough be amended and supplemented as follows:

4-1.6 TRANSFERABILITY

Except as otherwise provided, a license shall apply only to the person to whom it was issued and shall not be transferable to another person. Licenses may be transferred from place to place, in cases, where the licensed activity is conducted at a fixed location, but only with the written approval of the Zoning Official. The fee for the transfer of a license from place to place shall be five (\$5.00) dollars. (1971 Code Subsection 10-1.7; Ord. No. 11-01).

4-3 PEDDLERS, HAWKERS AND VENDORS

4-3.5 Restrictions.

- a. No person shall sell, offer for sale, hawk or peddle in the Borough any of the items listed in subsection 4-3.1 before 9:00 a.m. prevailing time or after 7:00 p.m. (1971 Code Subsection 10-3.5; New)
- b. The Borough Clerk shall maintain a list of names and addresses of residents who have determined that peddlers, hawkers and vendors shall not be invited to their respective residence. Any resident shall be included on such list if they complete a form to be so included. The form shall be available at Borough Hall. The list shall be distributed to applicants seeking a license for the purposes mentioned herein. The licensee shall not peddle or hawk at any residence on the list. Any peddler, hawker or vendor who goes upon any premises or rings a doorbell upon or near any door or creates any sound in any manner calculated to attract the attention of the occupant of such residence, when such residence is on the list provided shall be considered to be engaging in uninvited soliciting as set forth in Section 4-3.6.

4-4 SOLICITORS AND CANVASSERS

4-4.7 Restrictions.

- a. No soliciting or canvassing activities shall be conducted before 10:00 a.m. prevailing time or after 7:00 p.m. (1971 Code Subsection 10-4.7; New)
- b. The Borough Clerk shall maintain a list of names and addresses of residents who have determined that solicitors or canvassers shall not be invited to their respective residence. Any resident shall be included on such list if they complete a form to be so included. The form shall be available at Borough Hall. The list shall be distributed to applicants seeking a license for the purposes mentioned herein. The licensee shall not solicit or canvass at any residence on the list. Any solicitor or canvasser who goes upon any premises or rings a doorbell upon or near any door or creates any sound in any manner calculated to attract the attention of the occupant of such residence, when such residence is on the list provided shall be considered to be engaging in uninvited soliciting as set forth in Section 4-4.8.

4-4.8 Duty of Police to Enforce.

It shall be the duty of any Police Officer of the Borough to require any person seen soliciting or canvassing, and who is not known by such Officer to be duly licensed, to produce the peddler's license and to enforce the provisions of this Section against any person found to be violating the same. (1971 Code Subsection 10-3.6)

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED any Ordinances or portions thereof which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED if any provisions of this Ordinance, or the application of such provision to any person or circumstance is declared invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the other provisions or applications of this Ordinance, which can be given effect, and to this end, the provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable.

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon following the passage, adoption and publication pursuant to law.

*The general power to license and to prescribe license fees is contained in N.J.S.A. 40:52-1.2. Licensing is also a part of the general police power granted by N.J.S.A. 40:72-3 and R.S. 40:48-2.

ORDINANCE 15-21 ORDINANCE CREATING AN ANIMAL WELFARE ADVISORY COMMITTEE FOR THE BOROUGH OF MATAWAN

WHEREAS, there is public interest in the Borough of Matawan and its residents to create a committee of concerned citizens to provide guidance to the Municipality and information to residents concerning issues that are germane to domestic animals and animal welfare in an enlightened society; and

WHEREAS, it is a need and desire to create a public awareness committee that involves citizens for the dissemination of information and notifications concerning animals and their care, maintenance, treatment, and well-being generally and during periods of natural disasters and emergency; to provide information to the general public concerning the enforcement of animal cruelty laws and animal safety regulations, as well as the care and treatment of wild animals in our community; and the establishment of assistance to pet owners regarding animal poison information, stray cats, licensing, injured and abandoned wildlife, hoarding, spaying and neutering information, dogfighting, animal adoption resources in the State of New Jersey, pet loss and bereavement, humane education, pet friendly housing, and the relation of animal welfare with Borough Ordinances; and

WHEREAS, it would be the desire and intent of the Animal Welfare Advisory Committee to coordinate with other agencies of the Borough of Matawan to disseminate information concerning the implementation of resources and protections for animals and pet owners to residents and visitors of the Borough of Matawan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED AS FOLLOWS:

1. The Mayor and Council of the Borough of Matawan herewith create an Animal Welfare Advisory Committee (hereinafter, "the Committee") to be composed of three members appointed by the Mayor on an annual basis beginning January 1, 2016, which appointments shall be for a one-year period, subject to confirmation by the Council of the Borough of Matawan. The members shall serve until successors are qualified if not appointment is made on the anniversary of that member's appointment.

- 2. The members of the Committee shall not be employees of the Borough of Matawan and shall be unpaid, and the members shall not be able to receive any consideration or remuneration other than membership in the committee.
- 3. The Committee shall meet on an as-needed basis and shall provide reports to the Mayor and Council by May 31 and September 31 of every year concerning its activities and shall make regular recommendations to the Mayor and Council concerning issues involving animal welfare and shall be afforded opportunities for the dissemination of information on the Borough's website concerning animal welfare issues as they arise, subject to the approval of the chief administrative office of the Borough of Matawan.
- 4. The Committee shall not have any rights, duties, or obligations that are specifically delegated by law to enforcement agencies of the State, County, or Municipality concerning animal cruelty issues of any type.
- 5. If any part of this Ordinance is deemed to be illegal or ineffective, the other provisions shall nonetheless remain in force.

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately.

We understand the Borough intends to install a new pad-mounted weatherproof generator set at an exterior location in your municipal complex. The new generator will be powered by diesel fuel.

The Generator will serve the municipal complex through one utility service with an automatic transfer switch. It is our understanding that the Borough intends on purchasing the material, equipment and installation directly. Therefore, our scope of service is limited to the following:

SCOPE OF SERVICES

Scope of Services has been outlined by major work items.

Permitting

In accordance with N.J.A.C 7:27-8 all emergency generators with a gross heat input of 1,000,000 Btu/hr (Approximately 85kW) and greater are required to obtain an air preconstruction permit in order to legally operate in NJ. As applicable based on engine type and size, T&M will complete a NJDEP air permit for the proposed emergency generator.

T&M will complete an NJDEP General Air Permit GP-005A. This NJDEP Permit application has a \$410 fee and renews every 5 years. The compliance plan associated with this permit is limited to inspections and recordkeeping only, no source stack testing is required. T&M will also obtain a Facility ID# for the Borough which is required prior to submitting a permit application.



- b. The following quarterly fee will be required by the Borough of Matawan:
 - Sewer User Fee Noncommercial unit (Section 23-6.1.a) \$143.00 i.
 - Water Services User Fee (Section 22-2.2.a) ii.

- 2. Once fees are paid, the Borough would consider passing a resolution authorizing the connection into their sanitary sewer system. This is required by BSRA to obtain their approval.
- 3. Bayshore Regional Sewerage Authority (BSRA) approval would be required.
- 4. A road opening permit is required for work within the Little Street right of way. The applicant shall submit an application for permit to cut surface of Public Place for review.



Also, the Board of Education has requested a liaison between the Matawan and Aberdeen Councils. Councilman Urbano has agreed to act as liaison with Council Caldon as his second.

Mayor Buccellato announced his nomination and appointment of Joseph Saporito as Alternate I Member of the Unified Planning/Zoning Board of Adjustments for an unexpired term, said term to expire December 31, 2016.

Mayor Buccellato announced his nomination and appointment of Raymond Ayling as Alternate II Member of the Unified Planning/Zoning Board of Adjustments for an unexpired term, said term to expire December 31, 2016.

Mayor Buccellato announced his nomination and appointment of Matthew Schoffel as Member of the Environmental Commission for an unexpired three year term, said term to expire December 31, 2017.

Mayor Buccellato announced his nomination and appointment of Larry Magee as Member of the Environmental Commission for an unexpired three year term, said term to expire December 31, 2017.

Mayor Buccellato requested a motion. Councilman Urbano made the motion, seconded by Councilman Urbano. Council agreed. Motion passed.

Privilege of the Floor

The following is a verbatim translation for the Privilege of the Floor for the December 1, 2015 Council meeting.

Mayor Buccellato opened the Privilege of the Floor.

Fran Bucco, 79 Freneau Avenue, Matawan. Hi everybody. I just wanted to let you to know, that Kenny Marr, is that his name? He's a great guy. He calls me when something's done, he calls me when something's being done, he keeps me in the loop, he lets me know what's going on.." Councilwoman Clifton said, "You're not teasing us?" Mayor Buccellato said, "No, she's not, trust me, she's not." Councilwoman Clifton added, "I'm so happy for you." Ms. Bucco continued, "If you knew what I went through with Kenny Marr, him and I now are BFFs." Mayor Buccellato said, "I'm glad I could put the two of you together." Ms. Bucco replied, "You did, and the way you did was amazing. Anyway, he told me that the place behind my, the garbage dump behind my house isn't up to spec, and I knew that because you guys said, so they are going to try to make that into a recycling, and they are going to plant trees, but that's only a Band-Aid, he said. They're going to make plans to do another one in the woods up to spec for garbage. Councilwoman Clifton said, "Oh, thank God, I'm so happy for you." Ms. Bucco continued, "So if this happens, and I think with Kenny's get-up, it will."

Ms. Bucco continued, "One more question, I have to ask, about Dr. Ambrosio's house. I know it's privately owned and I know he's responsible to take care of it. And you all know, he's not. And I do believe it's listed on the historical society list because it's that old. It's not? Okay. Well anyway, isn't there anything that you can do to make him make it look half-way decent? That house is just going into shambles. Anybody?"

Mayor Buccellato noted, "It's a private structure, privately owned."

"Isn't there an ordinance or something in town, where they must keep up the property?" Ms. Bucco asked.

Councilwoman Clifton said, "Well, he mows his lawn. That's it, huh? Can't make him put paint on, can't make him fix the wood, the rot?" Someone then indicated that they could try.

Mayor Buccellato directed Mr. Ferrara, stating, "It's the blue house, on Main. The Ambrosia house." Mr. Ferrara asked, "The blue house?" Mayor Buccelatto continued, "See if you can talk to Kenny. I'll give you the owner's cell phone number..."

"Oh, I'll talk to Kenny," Ms. Bucco interrupted.

"...I know him," Mr. Ferrara stated.

"I have his number," Ms. Bucco continued. "I have it on speed-dial." Mr. Ferrara indicated that they had his number. Ms. Bucco went on, "Yea, I got his number, too. Yea. Thanks to you, I got it really good." She laughed and said, "Anyway, I think that's it. But I'll keep you up-to-speed on that Preserve property." She laughed and Mayor Buccellato said, "Thank you. And I'm glad it's working out." Ms. Bucco then said, "Oh, me too."

Mayor Buccellato then asked if Loretta Windas wanted to say anything. Ms. Windas then said, "You know me well."

Loretta Windas, 138 Aberdeen Road. Ms. Windas again thanked Mayor and Council saying, "I just want to thank everybody for coming together and giving the okay for the Animal Welfare Advisory Committee, or Animal Team. Whatever we want to call it."

She continued, "I think it's going to be really fun putting it together. I'm looking forward to doing it with whomever we put on it. Paul, I hope that you're going to help me out with that. You have mentioned that you were interested in, you know, doing some sort of advisory thing with that. So it's going to be great. Thanks so much for helping out with this and for being so supportive and so easy and dreamy to work with." She quickly added, "I can't believe I said dreamy." The audience laughed.

"Anyway, I just wanted to say thanks. And my colleague from the Humane Society of the United States is here, as well. She is the NJ Director for the HSUS. So I think she wanted to say a little something, as well.

Kathleen Schatzmann, 94 White Pine Drive, Colts Neck. Ms. Schatzmann announced, "I am the NJS Director for the Humane Society. And I just wanted to note that this is only the second municipality in the State that has enacted an Animal Advisory Board arm." She went on, "So we applaud your efforts, and we appreciate you recognizing the role that animals have in the community, because this is most definitely a people issue, as well as an animal issue. So we thank you for your efforts." And she followed up, "And of course we are here as a resource for you."

Mayor Buccellato said, "Thank you."

Brett Cannon, 217 Middlesex Road, Matawan. "Good Evening Council. Mayor Buccellato I appreciate the sarcasm that while Council members live on the streets recently approved for paving." Mayor Buccellato stated it was not sarcasm. Mr. Cannon continued, "I'm glad to see it wasn't another Marc Woods Street.

"Good Evening. I would like to start by saying that I don't really have a question here but that I'd like to utilize my Constitutional right as a citizen of the Borough of Matawan in addressing the elected officials who preside over me. I teach 8th grade government so my belief is that the ability to voice one's opinion in a public forum is essential and vital to the sustainability of a representative democracy.

"The main concern that brings me up here tonight is when you live somewhere for 27 years and you are born and raised, you hear rumblings around town, and some of the rumblings I've been hearing is that the previous campaign that was run ran nasty and personal barrage attacks over some members sitting here tonight. Secondly, it's also been said that the promises of the newly-elected Mayor and Council Members is unattainable and not feasible. Let me address those two points, seeing as those rumblings may have originated from some members sitting in front of me. First the Altomonte campaign did not run personal or malicious attacks. They stated facts. I received the same pamphlets you did. I read them just like you did. I had no creation in them, and I was just as interested as you all were. Nothing was brought up about personal lives, family

members, personal finances, family issues or anything else of a personal nature.

"Instead, your job as elected officials was examined and your progress or lack thereof was illustrated for the public to see. Strictly, your job as Council members and Mayor was talked about, nothing more nothing less. Secondly, the unfeasibility of Altomonte's promises. Let's be real here for a minute. If Joe Altomonte takes office in January and does absolutely nothing, it just maintains the status quo. If you think I'm exaggerating, let me illustrate it for you.

"I went to college at Purdue University in West Lafayette, Indiana. I graduated in 2010. My former roommate from college came out to visit. We were driving around town. We came up along the side of the building here. He turned to me from the passenger seat and said to me, 'What is that an abandoned school?' I said, 'No, that's my town hall.'

"I was embarrassed that one of my closest friends came from three states away, and he looks at my town hall and sees an abandoned school. And that's illustrative of what has taken place in this township."

Councilman Urbano interjected, "Brett, I have to stop you for a second. Did you explain to your friend that the Community Center here was going through an energy audit?"

Mr. Cannon replied, "I explained to him that there have been numerous, uh, excuses and, uh..."

Councilman Urbano then said, "I mean, is that what you consider that, an excuse?"

Mr. Cannon replied, "Well, if you let me finish I'd like to continue, and I think that will answer your question. And, no, do I know the inner workings like you do Councilman Urbano, I do not. You have been on the Council and know the inner workings; you are able to sit in the Executive Sessions, so if we are going to sit here and debate the knowledge base that we are both coming from, you surely will win."

Councilman Urbano said, "Well I mean, you make a statement as though we're neglecting it, but yet there's been an energy audit in the works for a few years now, it's not an easy process."

Mr. Cannon replied, "I understand that, but I'm giving you the perception that is perceived from people who are unaware. Maybe the communication to the constituents would further explain that. So if I may continue. I've lived here for 27 years, as I've stated, born and raised. Let's hop into a time machine and go back to 2001. The ticket for the Republican Council was Paul Buccellato, Donna Gould and Mike Cannon. I remember as a 13 year old in Middle School sitting in Mayor Clifton's living room stuffing envelopes promising Main Street redevelopment and Train Station redevelopment. Inside the packet it detailed an entire plan that has yet to come to fruition. How did that go? Well, I stand before you today not as a Middle School student but as a Middle School teacher. That's the time frame we're talking about. We're not talking about one or two years. We're talking about myself stuffing envelopes as a Middle School student, and now I'm standing here as a Middle School teacher with the same issues that were stuffed in that envelope not being done. Our town continues to deteriorate. The bricks that were put into Main Street after that election now rot, crumble and cause motor vehicle damage when you ride over them. And trust me I drive over them every day myself. Main Street's a disaster. You have an empty Aby's Restaurant, you have a hole in the ground, you have a laundromat, a check cashing store..."

Mayor Buccellato asked, "Brett, what point are you making?"

Mr. Cannon replied, "I'm getting there."

Mayor Buccello asked, "Alright, I just want to know, is this your campaign starting? I just want to make sure."

Mr. Cannon replied, "Mayor Buccellato, I uh..."

Mayor Buccellato replied, "Mr. Cannon, continue."

Mr. Cannon replied, "Thank you. Those are not the anchored businesses that were promised during previous campaigns. Train station continues to be neglected and, more importantly, underutilized. You have a gold mine sitting there. Empty parking lots sitting there. I teach this for a living so, under Amendment 5 of the Bill of Rights of the US Constitution it allows for a thing called eminent domain, if that's the issue.

"Let me ask you if this is fair. Is this a fair point to bring up? That Gravelly Brook Park sits there with a building that is literally rotting away, and that's not an exaggeration. Literally rotting away."

Councilman Urbano asked, "Brett, are you aware that we have a grant to rehab Gravelly Brook that we got last year? \$350,000?"

Mr. Cannon, replied "I am aware of that. And, I'm also aware that it's been promised for 15 years. And that's not an exaggeration. You have a baseball field that looks like it's out of a scene of 'The Walking Dead'. For those of you that don't know what 'The Walking Dead' is, it's a post-apocalyptic zombie world in which humans cannot maintain anything.

"Is it a fair point to bring up the allocation of road programs? I drove around every single street in Matawan, by myself. That, again, is not an exaggeration. Literally, every street. And, when I tell you that all the new roads in Marc Woods, which is where my previous comment came from and where I grew up, is all brand new streets: Mohawk, Fawn, Indian, Union, Daniel, Ned, may I continue?"

Councilman Urbano said, "Sure, go ahead. Do you know the age of those streets when they were done? Those streets were 40 years old."

Mr. Cannon replied, "I know that Poet Drive has been sitting there for 40 years unpaved. Poet Drive, have you been to Poet Drive, or did you think that was part of Marlboro?"

Councilman Urbano replied, "No, I know where Poet Drive is, I know where the boundaries of Matawan are."

Mr. Cannon stated, "Okay, so Poet Drive has not been paved in 40 years."

Councilman Urbano stated, "We can't do them all in one shot."

Mr. Cannon said, "But we can do an entire neighborhood."

Councilman Urbano replied, "We didn't do it all in one year."

Mayor Buccellato interjected stating, "Obviously, you are not aware of how the Road Program operates, so just continue."

Mr. Cannon said, "I wasn't aware Matawan had a Road Program."

Mayor Buccellato and Councilwoman Clifton both replied, "Yes, we do." Then Mayor Buccellato said, "Please continue."

Mr. Cannon continued stating, "If your child's school had mold, non-working bathrooms and half the building sitting empty, would you complain? Probably, yes, but your current Police

station sits in the same condition. The men on our front lines have a building that is not suitable or habitable. Matawan has about 12 to 14 apartment complexes, continuously raising school taxes."

Mayor Buccellato asked, "You know that?"

Mr. Cannon replied, "Yes, I do."

Mayor Buccellato asked, "What is the basis of that statement?"

Mr. Cannon replied, "Well, your solution is to build more and slap..."

Mayor Buccellato said, "I didn't ask you that. What is the basis of that comment? How many students are coming out of the current units that we have?"

Mr. Cannon answered, "I'm sorry, I don't think I'm interpreting your question."

Mayor Buccellato said, "I'll explain it again. How many students are coming out of the apartments?"

Mr. Cannon replied, "I don't have an exact figure. But I live in one of those apartment complexes, and I can tell you there's quite a few kids, so I can tell you from my own personal experience. Do I have the exact statistic for you? I do not."

Mayor Buccellato informed, "Would you be interested to know that the majority of the student increase in population is from Aberdeen?"

Mr. Cannon replied, "Aberdeen's double the size. That doesn't surprise me one bit."

Mayor Buccellato continued, "So then out of 100 or close to 200 new students in the school district, Matawan probably accounts for about 40 of those students."

Mr. Cannon replied, "Because Matawan is half the size."

Mayor Buccellato asked, "Would you agree to that? Would you at least accept that? And that's from the Board of Ed."

Mr. Cannon answered, "If that's an actual statistic, I would accept that. If that's what you're telling me."

Mayor Buccellato said, "Yes, I've met with the Board of Ed."

Mr. Cannon continued, "So why do I stand before you today? Some of you are probably feeling attacked, clearly. There was no issue asking me to stuff envelopes 15 years ago. Only to leave me embarrassed in the town that I live in. So why am I up here? We need change. Have I angered some of you? Good. I think some of you have sat up here for too long, with no pressure at all. You've capitalized on voter apathy and have become complacent as a result. When the new Mayor and Council members take office I hope you will work to improve the stature of this town. We have beautiful neighborhoods with residents paying \$10,000 to \$15,000 a year in property taxes, yet when you drive through the main arteries of town it gives you a completely different feel. 900 voters spoke their mind a couple of weeks ago. If that doesn't wake some of you up, I don't know what will. So I ask you, is it really a nasty attack on you or are you really not aware of the town's current condition? Thank you for your time. Enjoy the holidays.

Fran Bucco, 79 Freneau Avenue, Matawan. Ms. Bucco tersely said, "First of all I think when he was stuffing envelopes, he was a young child, and it wasn't you guys who made this town the

way it is today. And, believe me I have issues with The Preserve, you know that and you've all helped me. But he's a fresh little boy and he has a lot to learn. Mr. Cannon. Very fresh and rude, and it wasn't you guys who put this town in this position, and in my eyes you guys have done very well for this town, and I can't say that with any more – I have lived here 40 years, and when you were a little boy in diapers, I'm sure your father taught you to respect your elders. At any rate, I think you guys did a great job and I am truly sad, I'm truly sad that you're leaving. Because the buildings that were shown in the pamphlets were privately owned buildings. You guys had nothing to do with their appearances, nothing. And it was a very dirty campaign. And that's from me, and I'm sorry. And my name is Fran Bucco, and I've been here 40 years and you guys were the best, I'm sorry. I'm not sorry, I'm happy, and that's my opinion."

LeRoy Sickels, 2 Fawn Drive, Matawan. Mr. Sickels said, "I've been in this town for 66 years, and four generations on both sides of my family have also been here. And to the Council, just want to say this (Mr. Sickels proceeded to clap his hands).

Mayor Buccellato and members of the council thanked Mr. Sickels.

Art Kiefer, 9 Elm Place, Matawan. Mr. Kiefer said, "I've been coming here for about the past two years, I guess. Coming to the Council meetings. I've heard things that you've been doing and are trying or attempting to do, and I've never seen you here. So if you have things you have to say, you have to complain about you should have been here when they were working here. You wait until the end to say this? You're timing's pretty off. That's all."

Mayor Buccellato closed the Privilege of the Floor.

Adjournment

Mayor Buccellato requested a motion to adjourn. Councilman Lopez made the motion, seconded by Councilwoman Clifton. Council agreed. Motion passed.
